

WEEKLY HIGHLIGHTS REPORT JANUARY 3, 2020

City Manager

• Fair Share Impact Fees – At its Jan. 8 meeting, City Council will review a draft ordinance pertaining to recommended rates for parks, mobility (transportation) and public safety impact fees. Previously (July 10, 2019), the City's rate consultant Raftelis presented to Council the 2019 Development Impact Fee Study, after which staff solicited input from community and business groups. The draft ordinance includes the recommended rate structure as proposed by the consulting firm as well as an exemption for affordable housing. Council can choose to enact rates at



the recommended 100% level or select a reduced percentage. At the 100% recommended rate level, a 2,500 square foot single-family home would increase from \$1,273 to \$3,820. General office per 1,000 square foot would increase from \$330 to \$610, and retail/restaurant per 1,000 square foot from \$770 to \$990. Impact fees are charged on new development and assist in paying for a portion of growth-related impacts on parks, mobility and public safety. Based on Council discussion and direction, staff will then prepare the ordinance for public hearings in February.

• 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan — The Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) has been preparing their 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) since mid-2019. An aspect of the Plan is the development of an extensive number of Public Participation opportunities soliciting public opinion for the transportation planning "needs" for City and County residents. The MPO and their consultant (Tindale-Oliver Inc.) has prepared a survey asking individuals to share their ideas and opinions utilizing the LRTP survey. - Upcoming Events National League of Cities Service Line

 Program Also at the Jan. 8 City Council meeting a discussion will take place about the National League of Cities Service Line Program. This program is an educational program that is at no cost to the City. The program provides four key benefits for NLC members that participate:
 - ✓ Educates resident homeowners about their service line responsibilities.
 - ✓ Provides an affordable solution that helps residents avoid the often-high cost of water and sewer service line repairs.
 - ✓ Engages local contractors to perform the repairs that contribute to the local economy.
 - ✓ Creates a new source of funding for projects that benefit the community.

The NLC <u>Service Line</u> Warranty Program is currently available in nearly 500 cities and municipalities across the country and has helped more than 100,000 homeowners save money on service line repairs and replacements since the Program began. Costs to the homeowner to participate are \$5.75 per month for the water line program, \$7.75 for the sewer line program and \$9.99 for the plumbing program.

• Liquid Aluminum Sulfate Antitrust Litigation – The City received a letter from Attorney General Ashley Moody providing notification that an electronic transfer was made in the amount of \$128,548.65 representing the City's share of the settlement of the liquid aluminum sulfate antitrust case. This case was in regards to alleged price-fixing among certain manufacturers of liquid aluminum sulfate. Attorney General Moody also thanked City staff for the time and effort put in to the collection of documentation that assisted in the litigation of the case.

Engineering

- Veterans Park Phase II The contractor has completed rough grading of the site and has indicated that they will be finalizing underground electric installation and will begin pouring concrete sidewalks and curbs during the week of Jan. 6.
- Alligator Creek Pedestrian Bridge (US 41 NB FDOT Right-of-Way) Work has resumed following the holiday break. The multi-use trail will remain closed to pedestrians and cyclists until further notice. The project is on track to complete by Feb. 2020.
- Citywide Drainage Swale Regrading To date JRL Underground has completed work at 589 properties totaling 446,250 square feet of grading/sodding. Work is underway in Burnt Store Isles and during the week of January 6 will include work along San Sebastian Ct. and Tripoli Blvd.
- Intersection ADA Improvements The following ADA ramp locations are complete: Myrtle and Narranja, Hazel and Myrtle, Ida and Cooper, Showalter and Mary, Showalter and Cooper, Fitzhugh and Booth, Booth and Virginia, E Helen and Mary and E. Helen and Milus streets.

Canal Maintenance

• Beginning the week of Jan. 13 through Jan. 31 (weather and equipment operation permitting), the Ponce Inlet is scheduled to be dredged. The contractor will off load dredge material at the vacant lot at the southerly end of Colony Point; then the material will be transported to another location by dump trucks.



- Seawall Replacement Projects
 - Marine Contracting Group has completed two of the 37 seawalls in PGI with five seawalls under construction.
- Crews filled 14 depressions and repaired three seawall caps.
- Seawall Assessment Program The Seawall Assessment continues, crews are currently working in the NE zone. The assessment is expected to be completed by Feb. 2020.
- **Ponce De Leon Inlet Dredge Program** The Ponce Inlet is scheduled to be dredged starting the week of Jan. 13. The work is expected to be completed by Jan. 31.

Buckley's Pass Additional Harbor Access

• Dredging of the pass is ongoing. The land between plug Alligator Creek and the PGI canal system will be removed over the next few days. Boaters NEED to stay out of the new pass until construction completed. Damage to vessel propulsion systems is very likely to occur if they enter the pass. The canals between Almar Drive



and River Bay Drive and Sea Edge Drive will be closed to through traffic during dredging operations. Boaters should use caution when operating near the construction area. Trucking of dredge spoils from Casey Key Drive to the Colony Point Drive spoil site continues.

- No Texting While Driving Remember Florida's texting law, which prohibits texting while driving and the use of handheld wireless communications devices (even talking on the phone unless hands-free) while driving in school zones or work zones except for emergencies. Fire Department

- **Driving in Fog** Due to recent weather conditions, Charlotte County has experienced several vehicle accidents, some with life threatening injuries. Fog can occur at any time. Fog on highways can be extremely dangerous. Fog is often unexpected, and visibility can deteriorate rapidly. You should watch for foggy conditions and be ready to reduce your speed. Do not assume that the fog will thin out after you enter it. It is best to avoid driving in fog. It is preferable that you pull off the road into a rest area or truck stop until visibility is better. If you must drive, be sure to consider the following:
 - ✓ Check traffic conditions before traveling, by dialing 511 or visiting <u>www.511.org</u>.
 - ✓ Obey all fog-related warning signs and slow down before you enter fog.
 - ✓ Use low-beam headlights and fog lights for best visibility even in daytime, and be alert for other drivers who may have forgotten to turn on their lights.
 - ✓ Watch for vehicles on the side of the roadway. Seeing taillights or headlights in front of you may not be a true indication of where the road is ahead of you. The vehicle may not be on the road at all.
 - ✓ Listen for traffic you cannot see and avoid passing other vehicles.
 - ✓ Don't stop along the side of the road, unless absolutely necessary.
 - ✓ Reduce the Distractions in your vehicle. Turn off the radio and cell phone. Your full attention is required.
 - ✓ Use the Right Edge of the road or painted road markings as a guide.
 - ✓ Signal Turns well in advance and brake early as you approach a stop
