

# Weekly Highlights Report July 23, 2021

## **City Manager**

• City Manager Column – On July 1, a significant change was made to a State law that impacts the way our Code Enforcement Department operates. In the past, residents could phone or email in a report of a suspected code of ordinances violation anonymous.

Florida Statute Chapter 162 no longer permits anonymous violation complaints. When a resident would like to report a situation they would like investigated, they must give their name and address before accepting your complaint. Florida Statute Chapter 162, 162.06 (1) (b); and 162.21 (3) (b): A Code Enforcement Officer may not initiate enforcement proceedings for



a potential violation of a duly enacted code or ordinance by way of an anonymous complaint. A person who reports a possible violation of a code or an ordinance must provide their name and address to the respective local government before an enforcement proceeding may occur.

The fear of retaliation is often cited as a reason why a person wishes to remain anonymous. If a complainant states that they have a substantial fear of retaliation or status-based legal jeopardy directly when making a complaint. City staff will then advise the complainant that if the claim is a false claim of fear of retaliation or of status-based legal jeopardy, then they are liable for all costs incurred by the City of Punta Gorda in investigating the claim of violation, including costs of personnel, equipment, testing, and reasonable costs and attorney fees if the City of Punta Gorda brings an action to prosecute the complainant or to collect amounts made payable.

What hasn't changed is the city's philosophy on code enforcement. The goal is to achieve voluntary compliance with reported and discovered code violations. Education is the key to reaching this goal. One of the most significant obstacles to gaining compliance is that many citizens do not realize that they are violating local ordinances. For instance, it is not at all unusual for a resident to be unaware that parking a vehicle on the city right-of-way without a valid tag, or parking an inoperable car on your private property, violates city code. Suppose a code enforcement officer finds a code violation. In that case, an attempt is made to verbally contact the property owner and issue a Courtesy Notice via hand delivery; a notice left on-premises, or via the United States Postal Service mail. The property owner is given reasonable time to correct the violation, and the property is then re-inspected. If the violation was corrected, the complaint is closed. If the violation is not corrected, a Certified Mail notice of violation is sent. The owner is given reasonable time again to fix the issue, and a re-inspection retakes place. #### **Canal Maintenance**

- How to Find out If Your Seawall Is Scheduled for Replacement Residents have been asking how they know when their seawall is scheduled for replacement and how the process works. Every year the City replaces approximately 7,000 lineal feet of seawall. By utilizing the Seawall Assessment Data, the seawall replacement program is planned a year in advance (unexpected seawall failures or seawalls that are inspected and found to be at extreme risk of failure are given top priority and may bump planned projects to the following year). - **Seawall Replacement Projects** The seawall replacement contractor has seven projects under construction and 19 projects completed in Punta Gorda Isles. There are 26 seawall replacement projects scheduled for Punta Gorda Isles. All seawall replacement projects are completed for Burnt Store Isles this fiscal year. A seawall project is not considered complete until the sod has been placed.

#### **Engineering**

- Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Sidewalk Ramp Improvements The contractor continues with demolition, construction and updates for (ADA) sidewalk ramps
- Adrienne Street Pier The contractor is tentatively scheduled to complete pile jacket installations this week, weather permitting. Work is also being completed on the decking and hand rails.

- **Boca Grande Drainage Improvements** Bi-weekly design project update meetings continue. The design is in process, with 60% to 90% plans complete.
- City Wide Drainage Swale Regrading The contractor has indicated that they will begin work on the punch list next week. A new swale contractor has been selected. Swale regrading will begin once everything has been finalized to commence work.
- **Henry Street Sidewalk** All surveying information has been received and the design will continue. We will begin coordination with FDOT on work within their drainage easement and the sidewalk connection at US41.

## Right of Way

• West End Drive Lighting Project – The lighting has been installed. The Right of Way department is working diligently on completing the restoration work on the swale on West End Drive. The swale work will be completed by the end of next week (weather permitting).

## **Police**


• Wear it Florida – Did you know that Florida has the unfortunate distinction of being the national leader in annual boating fatalities? A majority of fatalities every year are boaters that are reported swimmers who fall overboard and drown. These deaths can be easily prevented by wearing a lifejacket. Wearing a lifejacket can mean the difference between a fun day on the water and becoming a statistic. Don't believe it could happen to you? It happens in Florida to an average of one person each week who never thought it could happen to them either. This is where the Wear It Florida campaign comes in to play. The campaign goal is clear and simple: to increase the number of recreational boaters who consistently wear a life jacket while on the water.

## Common Misconceptions Associated with Life Jacket Wear

- I'm a great swimmer! Why would I need to bother with a life jacket? Even the greatest swimmers aren't always ready to be thrown overboard and a quick look at boating safety statistics make that quite evident. Typically, over half of Florida's boating fatalities each year are due to falls overboard and boaters entering the water unprepared.
- ➤ I'm not a kid; I'm an experienced boater. I know what I'm doing. Age and experience don't float. They also are not good indicators of whether you would survive an unexpected fall overboard.
