### **City Manager**

City Manager Column - With the changing of the seasons has come an influx of both new and seasonal residents to the City of Punta Gorda. Many new residents aren't familiar with the type of government structure the city operates under per our charter. The City of Punta Gorda has a City Council/City Manager form of government. The City Council is responsible for enacting ordinances and resolutions that the City Manager administers. The voters of Punta Gorda elect five Councilmembers to serve for a two-year term. Councilmembers reside in a specific District, are elected at large in staggered terms, and elections occur in November. This year district three elected Mark Kuharski, and district five elected Melissa Lockhart. The City Council elects the Mayor and Vice-Mayor at the first meeting held after an election. The City Council unanimously reappointed Lynne Matthews (district four) to Mayor and Debby Carey (district two) to Vice-Mayor. Jaha Cummings continues to serve as the district one



representative. Each of our distinguished representatives brings unique experience and backgrounds to their roles on City Council. Mayor Lynne Matthews has extensive business experience, having owned a motorcoach and tour charter company and previously working in the hospitality industry for over twenty-five years. This background, combined with years of experience on various boards and commissions within the city, has led the Mayor to understand that she can help keep the city moving forward with intelligent, commonsense growth and development while keeping the small-town charm and character that has drawn so many others here to our beautiful city. Vice-Mayor Debby Carey brings a strong teaching background, having taught in public high schools and non-profits organizations. The Vice-Mayor also served on the Board of Directors for six years as Secretary and President of Punta Gorda Isles Civic Association (PGICA). She is Secretary of the Punta

- FPL strengthens energy grid serving Punta Gorda as part of reliability and storm preparedness efforts Florida Power and Light Company (FPL) customers in Punta Gorda continue to benefit from the company's ongoing work to strengthen the energy grid and improve service reliability. FPL investments, which include strengthening power lines and poles, trimming trees near power lines and installing smart grid technology, have helped improve day-to-day reliability more than 40% over the last decade while speeding restoration following major storms. While FPL continues to make the energy grid stronger, customers may see old poles next to the new ones because many of our poles hold wires and other equipment for other utilities, including telephone, telecommunications and cable TV services. Before FPL can remove the old poles, it must wait for the other utilities to transfer their equipment to the new ones. This causes double pole situations, which often do not affect the reliable service provided to FPL customers. After all equipment has been taken off the pole, FPL schedules the pole's removal. Public Workshop – Punta Gorda City Council will hold a public workshop on Nov. 19, at 10 a.m. to discuss the proposed changes to the City of Punta Gorda, Code of Ordinances, Chapter 26, Land Development Regulation. City staff will provide a presentation focusing specifically on Building Height, Community Benefits



Program, Architecture and Implementation. The workshop will be held in City Council Chambers at 326 West Marion Avenue, Punta Gorda, FL 33950. The public will have an opportunity to address the Council for three minutes and present relevant information on the topic. Urban Design staff completed a draft of a new element to the City's Comprehensive Plan. Required under the provisions of Florida Statute Section 163.3177 (6)(i), the new Property Rights Element will: Identify specific property rights and state that local government will respect them. Identify the rights of people to participate in decisions that affect their lives and property. Provide standards for local government decision-making to be reliable and predictable to promote sound, long-term investments in a community. The new element will be discussed at the Nov. 22, Planning Commission and Dec. 1, City Council meetings.

• 1000 Friends of Florida Webinar – Staff attended the "Pre-empting Local Government Authority in Florida" webinar put on by 1000 Friends of Florida. Preemption can be described as the use of state law to nullify a local government ordinance or authority. This issue is becoming increasingly problematic in Florida, as each year the legislature passes bills that supersede local authority on issues ranging from collecting impact fees, regulating building design, banning plastic bags, regulating cruise ships and more. The discussions focused on the impacts of inappropriate preemption and the need for more proactive advocacy to counter the problem.

### **Public Works**

#### **Canal Maintenance**

- Canal Odor Don't be alarmed if you have noticed an odor floating up from your canals. The water in our canals and ponds is on the move vertically! The surface water, which was warmed by the hot summer sun, has been cooling down as the temperatures drop causing the water to 'flip' or 'turn'. This means that the bottom (including silt, decomposing plant material and miscellaneous debris) comes to the surface bringing with it a smell of stagnant water, while the surface water goes to the bottom. This is a natural occurrence and typically lasts approximately two weeks then returns to normal.
- Seawall Replacement Projects Punta Gorda Isles has 42 seawall replacement projects scheduled for this fiscal year and the seawall replacement contractor has six projects under construction. Burnt Store Isles has seven seawall replacement projects scheduled for this fiscal year and at this time none are under construction. A seawall replacement project can consist of multiple properties. A seawall project is not considered complete until the sod has been placed.

Crews filled depressions at 24 locations.

Crews manufactured 30 (10' linear feet) seawall panels.

Crews conducted sonar depth soundings at W. Marion and Colony Point Bridge.

Crews performed channel marker check at Ponce De Leon inlet channel waterway.

• Seawall Replacement Schedule - The annual Seawall Replacement Work Program can be found on the City of Punta Gorda website under Canal Maintenance <a href="https://www.ci.punta-gorda.fl.us/home/showpublisheddocument/12550/637643718591830000">https://www.ci.punta-gorda.fl.us/home/showpublisheddocument/12550/637643718591830000</a>. Every year the City replaces approximately 12,000 linear feet of seawall. By utilizing the Seawall Assessment Data, the seawall replacement program is planned a year in advance (unexpected seawall failures or seawalls that are inspected and found to be at extreme risk of failure are given top priority and may bump planned projects to the following year).

#### **Engineering**

- **Boca Grande Drainage Improvements** Bi-weekly design project update meetings continue. Pending are receipt of the 90% plans for City review. The engineering firm has placed submittal to the Southwest Florida Water Management District permitting on the look ahead. A project site visit review is scheduled on Nov. 16 for a potential grant opportunity.
- **Henry Street Sidewalk** Final construction plan revisions and drainage calculations are being completed. Coordination will continue with FDOT on work within their drainage easement and the sidewalk connection at US41.

• Paving Program Street Resurfacing – The contractors work schedule commenced on

Nov. 9 for layout with milling and resurfacing to continue through Dec. 1 (weather and operations depending). • **Harbor Walk West End Lighting** – The installation of five additional decorative lights street between Shreve Street and the tidal bridge at the west end of Retta Esplanade has begun. The underground conduits and light bases have been installed and the electrical wiring is expected to be installed by the end of next week.

**Slow Down -** We have all been there, so when you are behind that garbage truck on your way to work, school or home, make sure you slow down and stop if required so that your waste and recycling workers can complete their jobs safely.

**Look For Workers -** Make sure that your eyes are peeled and you have looked for workers before you try to pass a garbage or recycling truck.

**Check For Traffic -** Before you try to pass a truck, ensure that you have checked for traffic coming in the opposite direction before going around the truck. This protects the garbage truck driver as well as yourself from any potential accidents.

**Avoid Distractions -** Make sure you don't text and drive. Keep your eyes on the road - not the radio, changing your GPS, or looking for that "thing" that fell between the seats.

### **Fire**

• **Deep Frying a Turkey** – When it comes to deep frying turkey, you want to take every precaution to keep your family and your home safe. Fried turkeys are delicious, but they come with a slew of safety issues. Thousands of fires as well as many injuries happen each year due to turkey fryer fires. The Punta Gorda Fire Department advises against using a turkey fryer. If you decide to do it anyway, these precautions should be followed;




- Fryers should always be used outdoors, on a solid level surface a safe distance from buildings and flammable materials.
- > Do not overfill the fryer.
- ➤ Never use a fryer on a wooden deck, under a patio cover, in a garage or enclosed space.
- Never leave the fryer unattended.
- ➤ Never let children or pets near the fryer when in use or after use as the oil can remain hot for hours.
- ➤ Use well-insulated potholders or oven mitts and wear long sleeves and safety goggles to protect from splatter.
- Make sure the turkey is completely thawed before it is placed in a fryer.
- ➤ Keep all-purpose fire extinguishers nearby.
- ➤ If a turkey fryer fire occurs, call 911 immediately.
- Training The fire department has been conducting vehicle extrication training all week. The training utilizes the Jaws of Life and crews work to safely access the passenger compartment of a wrecked vehicle to remove the occupants. All of the City's fire apparatus are equipped with extrication equipment and our firefighters are trained and prepared to perform whenever they may be needed.

• Maintenance – Team members have started to lift the buildings sections and bolting together the 20 pieces to form the building that will cover the Filter Press. The contracted vendor has continued to remove the old interior coating from the North tank at the Master Pumping Facility. Team members diagnosed a radio reception problem at the Master Pumping Facility and changed the faulty antenna splitter that was causing a loss of signal to the plants SCADA system.



• **Operations** – The average daily flow for the past week was 3.19 million gallons for a total of 22.31 million gallons of wastewater being treated this week.
