Dedication: June 21, 2007 - West Side of Rooney Building Known as Cracker Cattle, they were brought to Florida almost 500 years ago by the Spanish. This mural pays tribute to the breed which is still being carried on by today's modern Florida cattle ranches. This mural also brings attention to the Cow Hunters, their breed of horse and dog, that were used in finding, rounding up, and managing the cattle.





The seven "post cards" depict scenes of Punta Gorda from early 1900 to the 1930's. The first card shows the fountain that was located in the center of Marion Ave. The spring source was moved to the corner of Marion and Taylor where it is still in use. Other panels show "Teddy" Roosevelt in town fishing and hunting. Along with other notables, he was a frequent quest at the Princess Hotel. Next in line is the former fishing pier where boats unload their catches; a popular family owned bakery; a view of early "downtown;" the party held for the opening of the Barron Collier bridge and the "tin can" trailer park that was once located in the current Laishley Park. The mural is sponsored by Dr. and Mrs. Robert Andrews. Some observers have stated that the couple shown at the fountain mural looks like the Andrews. If so, perhaps this was the fabled "Fountain of Youth" sought by Ponce de Leon upon his visit to these shores.



"Lest We Forget"

This mural was dedicated as part of the Kiwanis Veterans Garden Project on Veterans Day 2005. The mural has a theme of peace, signified by a yellow ribbon tying the various war scenes together. The mural closely resembles the mural that the artist had painted on an interior wall of the old post office in 1991, but which was lost when the old post office was torn down.

'Nature's Harmony"

Dedication: May 17, 2007 - Laishley Marina Building

This is a reconstruction of a mural that was destroyed by Hurricane Charley. It depicts the harmony of nature, and focuses on the contributions of two important Punta Gorda residents. On the left side. Harry "Pete" Goulding developed several new strains of hibiscus plants by cross breeding and special pollination techniques. On the right is Phil Laishlev, a prominent Punta Gorda politician, and the man for whom Laishlev Park was named.

"Captivating Charlotte County"

Dedication: October 18, 2007 - Laishley Marina Boat Ramp

Captivating Charlotte County represents a celebration of wildlife found in Charlotte County. Two distinctly different environments are depicted. The split screen format shows aquatic life, grasses and mangroves that thrive beneath the water line. Snook hide in the mangrove roots searching out smaller fish, crabs scurry along the grassy harbor bottom, turtles dive while dolphin and manatee skim the surface. A large alligator looms in the corner. Above the water line shows the distinctive habitat of local bird life. A great blue heron perches on the mangrove limbs along with a green heron. Seagulls soar in the air while a Sandhill Crane, along with her chicks, Roseate Spoonbills and Sandpipers fish the shoreline. In addition, this mural has some "hidden" wildlife for viewers to discover.



"End of the Line"

Punta Gorda prospered when the railroad came to town, and was the end of the line. There are two murals on this building. The murals depict town founder Isaac Trabue, and Henry Plant, the man who built railroads on the west coast of Florida, specifically the end of the line in Punta Gorda.

One mural, taken from historic photos, is of steam locomotive Number 11 pulling into town. The second mural has emphasis on items shipped from this area. They included citrus, pineapple, cattle and seafood. These murals were sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of

Punta Gorda through a donation from Bob and Faye Strang, owners of the Strang Building. Artist Richard Currier says many don't know that Trabue and Plant did not like each other, but the developer and railroader needed each other. He said he purposely put a scowl on the faces as they appear looking at each other.




"First City Council"

Dedication: 2001 - West Side of City Hall Annex

The original picture of the first City Council is dated 1889. The men are identified as (L to R) Thomas Hector, City Clerk; J.O. Swisher, Alderman; E.L Fishback, Marshal; W.H. Burkland, Alderman; Kelly B. Harvey, Alderman; Neil Dahl, Alderman and James L Sandlin, Alderman. No one is designated as Mayor and no mention is made of W.H. Simmom, who was elected Mayor at the 1887 incorporation meeting. Further, Fishback seems to have replaced John Stanfield who was elected Marshal at that meeting.

Dedication: April 8, 1997 West Side of Building on Sullivan St. and W. Virginia Ave.

The mural titled "School Marms On The Bay" was taken from historic photos. It shows three school teachers rowing across the river to their school house in Charlotte Harbor (now the site of School House Square Shopping Center). The local mail boat of the times is shown with the historic Hotel Charlotte Harbor in the background.



There are 4 murals representing classic cars of the past. The mural facing North on W. Olympia is a 1932 Ford Coupe. Moving around to the front of the station on North 41, the 3 murals on the service bays depict from left to right, a 1948 Ford, a 1957 Chevrolet, and a 1957 Thunderbird.

2 "Saving Dollars Makes Sense"

Artist: Don Gutcher Dedication: 1998 East Side of Bank of America Building



These six mural panels show the history of banking in downtown Punta Gorda. The first panel shows Punta Gorda Bank, which opened in 1894 at the corner of W. Marion and Taylor Street. The bank moved to a new location in 1897 at W. Marion and Cross Street (Panel 2). In 1912 a rival bank, The Merchants Bank of Punta Gorda (Panel 3), opened on W. Marion between King and Taylor Streets. The white columned building is occupied now by Caldwell Trust Co. The old Punta Gorda State Bank was reorganized in 1917 (Panel 4). During the bank run of 1929, legend has it that the bank was saved when Collier arrived with a suitcase full of cash and depositor confidence was restored. It survived for a while but later failed. In 1925, the Charlotte Bay Hotel was built at W. Marion Ave. and Taylor St. That prime corner was occupied by the "Fidelity Trust Company" (Panel 5), a subsidiary of the "First National Bank of Punta Gorda." Fidelity Trust collapsed in the 1929 depression. Punta Gorda Federal Savings & Loan (Panel 6) was organized in 1934.



"Natural Beauty

This mural is a re-creation of the original mural that was painted at the town's busiest intersection of W. Marion Ave and Tamiami Trail

W. Marion Ave and Tamiami Trail (US 41 North), which was destroyed by Hurricane Charley. This is a four panel mural. It includes the city flower, the Punta Gorda Hibiscus; the city bird, the yellow crowned night heron; a roseate spoonbill; and the famous tarpon sporting fish.

4 "Black History in Punta Gorda"

Artist: Fran Hines Dedication: November 15, 2007 Baker Center School on East Charlotte Ave.



This mural is a rippling scroll with 11 portraits and scenes of people who were involved in the development of Punta Gorda. Included are portraits of Cornelius Ponder, John Lomas, O. B. Armstrong, Daniel Smith, Robert Meacham, Charles Bailey, Lucille Allen, and, of course Benjamine Baker, for whom the Baker Center School was named.

5 "Fishing Tales"

Artist: Jack Reto Dedication: 1998 North Side of Foot and Ankle Center Building



This mural depicts the importance of commercial and sports fishing to the development and history of Punta Gorda. When the United States acquired Florida from Spain, small fishing villages like Charlotte Harbor appeared. In 1886, the railroad was extended to what is now Punta Gorda, allowing fish to be sent north. Shrimp ("Pink Gold") became an important industry after WWII. Tarpon was, and remains, the top sports fish in the area. Tarpon tournaments have been here for years. The vivid pink and orange of the mural reflect the area's glorious sunscapes and the importance of Pink Gold.




"Evolution of Medicine"

Archaeologists and university officials supplied information to make the mural as authentic as possible. The second panel depicts conquistadors and a combat surgeon taking care of some of their soldiers. Panel number three was based on a 1882-83 malaria epidemic. The scene is inside a quarantine station on the bay side of Boca Grande. The station was moved to the Gulf side when they found it was the mosquito that carried the disease and the bay side was infested with the mosquitoes.

schooner Proctor used at first as a temporary quarantine station. The fifth mural shows Dr.

David N. McQueen, one of the first modern doctors to settle in our county near the turn of the century. Panel six is a painting of the first hospital built in Charlotte County in 1947. The facility had a dozen beds. Also shown are three scenes of early x-ray, operating table and patient bed.

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
